A PRIEST'S PONDERINGS...

The Rev. Allison Moore

Village Harmony is a singing group I love, and I am with them in Guadalajara, Mexico for a weeklong music workshop. But sometime during the first day of rehearsal, I was really wondering why I think it's fun to sing a cappella music in languages I don't know with people who generally have much more choral experience than I do. I was very frustrated.

Here are Insights from the three teachers that helped me remember why, by day three, I love this experience.

You have to know your own part very well, and work to be the best singer you can.

You also have to listen intently to all the other parts to see where you fit in and how all the other parts are as necessary as yours.

And, you have to understand the rhythm in your bones, because it is the underlying rhythm that unites everybody.

One teacher put it this way: rhythm is the heartbeat of the universe, in all the varieties of cultural expression. Melody conveys emotions about a unique perspective on common human experiences. The lyrics engage the brain, so singers offer "heart and soul and strength and mind" to each other and their community.

Imagine Jesus' Transfiguration as a professional performance of the piece we are singing, giving us a glimpse of our goal. Then the teachers give us music and lyrics, pronunciation and rhythm, bit by bit, just as our prayer book and Scripture and worship and music teach us to pray and make good choices (or not!!). Each of us has to go practice and make mistakes and learn our parts in prayer and in our daily life. Jesus teaches and corrects and heals and loves so we root ourselves more firmly in the Rhythm of The Universe. Then we come together, strengthening and blending our unique voices, to make love incarnate in the world. Welcome to Lent!

And this trip is not all hard work. Today we went to the town of Tequila, toured a tequila factory, and sang with a group of school children who regaled us with Mexican folk songs. Fun!

Actions for this week

You may want to consider signing this petition, asking to revoke a recent Executive Order that went into effect on January 29, 2026 preventing Cuba, an island nation, from importing oil or any energy sources needed to survive.

Hospitals will face impossible choices, risking the closure of wards and the suspension of critical treatments. The most vulnerable—children, the elderly, and the sick—will bear the brunt of this cruelty.

Allison writes from Mexico, “On this trip one of our teachers is Wilmia Verrier, whose mom and grandmother are in Cuba. A few days ago her region lost all power, all schools in the country have been closed, and there isn’t enough unrefrigerated food for people to eat. Wilmia is very afraid for her family and country. She asks us to pray.

This meaningful service will honor the legacy of the Reverend Absalom Jones, the first African American priest ordained in the Episcopal Church, whose groundbreaking ministry paved the way for a more diverse and inclusive priesthood. He was declared a saint in 1973, with a designated feast day of February 13.

The celebration will feature worship, music, dance, and spoken word. The Moses Commission will also be announcing its preliminary findings.
